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AROUND THE STATE: FSAs RESPOND TO PATIENT ASSAULT; JCS COs ASSAULTED BY DRUNK INMATE

Forensic Security Assistants (FSAs) at the Center for Forensic Psychiatry intervened in a violent patient-on-patient assault Jan. 3.

One patient hit another with a chair and then bit off a piece of his lip. The assaulted patient was sent out for medical care. The aggressor has attacked other patients and staff in the past, an FSA said.

A diffusion meeting was held for the staff who responded.

FSAs have dangerous jobs, too, that require them to run toward danger instead of away from it. Thank you, FSAs, for your handling of this incident. Stay safe. An inmate drunk on New Year's Eve assaulted four officers at Cooper Street and kicked a hole in a wall.

The Level I inmate was belligerent. Because all holding cells were full, officers took him to a strip search room. He was able to move his handcuffs to the front of his body, an officer said. He headbutted one CO and spit on another. Two other COs were also assaulted. One officer had a bloody nose, but no serious injuries were reported, an officer said.

The prisoner was drunk on spud juice.

father of two who loved to run and work out. He had a few pre-existing conditions but was managing them well through diet and exercise.

Then COVID hit Cooper Street. There were many cases in D-unit, where Ross was assigned. He was sent on a hospital run Nov. 17 and was mandated to work 16 hours that day. Ross said he was exhausted at the end of day, but thought it was just from work. He took a routine COVID test the next day, and a couple of days later, received a positive result.

"I did everything right," Ross said. "Wore my mask, washed my hands, social distanced. And I still got it."
